Top Tips:

- Think no tech, low tech, high tech (e.g. what technology access your students have)
- Provide clear communication around support hours and availability
- Set clear guidance, expectations and a roadmap on weekly tasks
- Provide equitable and accessible content and materials
- Build a Community of Inquiry to ensure learner and teacher social / cognitive presence
- Chunk content into bite size sections to avoid cognitive overload
- Break up live sessions with Q&A or breaks
- Build in scaffolding and support for learning including timely and mastery-oriented feedback

Some questions to think about:

- Are all tasks and assessments aligned to the learning outcomes?
- What are the various barriers that your learners face with access to materials, technology, timezones and language?
- Have you established online learner etiquette?
- Are you intentional and flexible in your approach and do you provide choice where possible?
- Are opportunities provided for students to become independent learners and to self-regulate?
- Have you checked with the library that the readings are available online?
- Do your videos have closed captions? (And have you checked these for accuracy?)
